- Are the fees proposed the same as current fees?
- Is there currently a number of kids that they have to turn away due to shelter needs?
- What is the size of the basketball court? Will the local schools have access to the facility?
- Do they plan to keeping the existing building?
- What are the major drivers for new revenue?
- What will the hours of operation be? Early access?
- How will this be affordable for people on a fixed income?

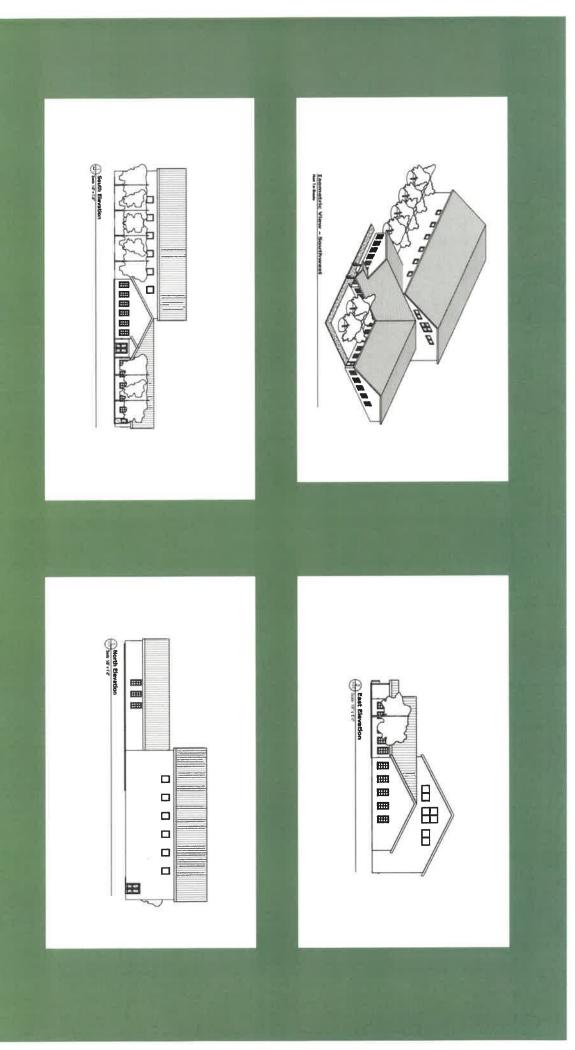

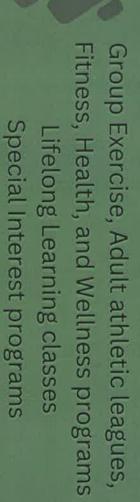
Inital Floorplan Concept:
